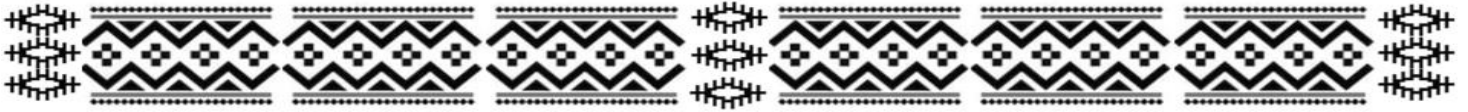

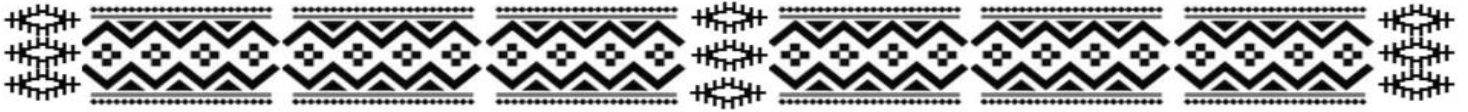

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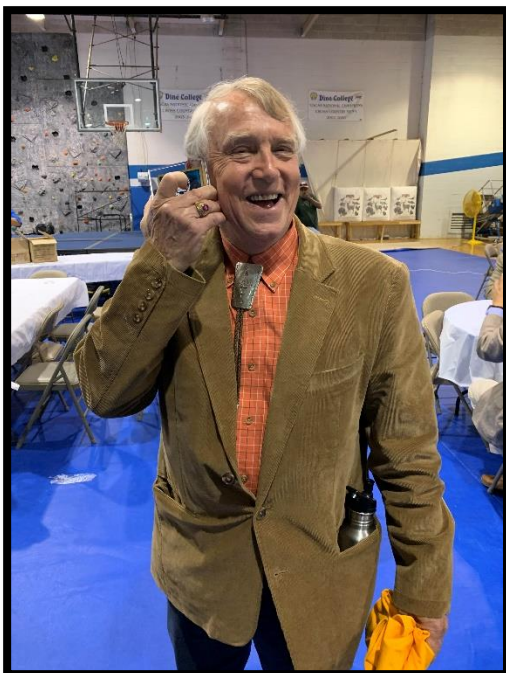
Faculty Highlight



Dr. Bruce Bradway, Psychology Faculty

Please introduce yourself: Hello, I am Bruce M. Bradway. I was born in Indiana in 1949. I spent from 1971-2001 either in or around the military. I have a BA in English (which makes me a grammar nerd), an AAS in Medical Laboratory Technology (which makes me a Medical nerd), an MA in Psychology, Guidance, and Counseling, an MS in International Relations (which makes me a Poli. Sci history nerd), and a Ph.D. in General Psychology (which makes me a psych nerd). I have lived in eleven different states and two countries. The military gives you the opportunity to live in some exotic locations and hopefully people aren't shooting at you or trying to blow you up.

Please tell us a little about your career background: My first college teaching experience came with Langston University (a historically Black College) in Oklahoma in 1991. I next taught at Mississippi University for Women and East Mississippi Community College. After my wife retired from the military we spent the next 11 years in Montana on the Fort Belknap Reservation. I was the chair of the Human Services and Psychology Department and enjoyed ten very challenging years. My eleventh year in Montana I taught for Salish-Kootenai College. Just before coming to Diné' College I spent 5 years teaching for Ashford University in Clinton, Iowa.

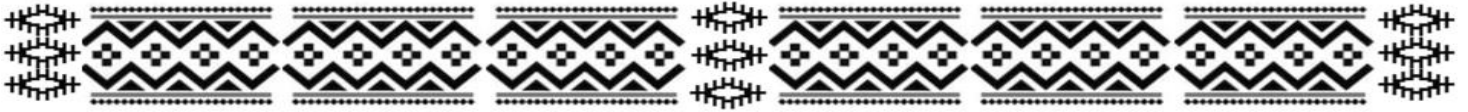
Please tell us why you chose to work here at Diné College, what made you gravitate towards us? I interviewed with several colleges and was offered positions with a state school in North Dakota and a Women's College in South Carolina. But neither were really in the running after I was offered the job at Diné' College. I was quite anxious to get back to a reservation though the difference between the Northern Plains and the Southwest is like the moon and the rain forest (actually the desert and the steppes).

What do you value the most? At this stage in my life I value friends and family. I have lived lots of places and I recognize that life is variable but people think in absolutes because they have only experienced singular experiences that they see as absolutes. I embrace the differences. As they say up North, "I wish everyone long life and good health."

Students attend NAU's Undergraduate Research Symposium!



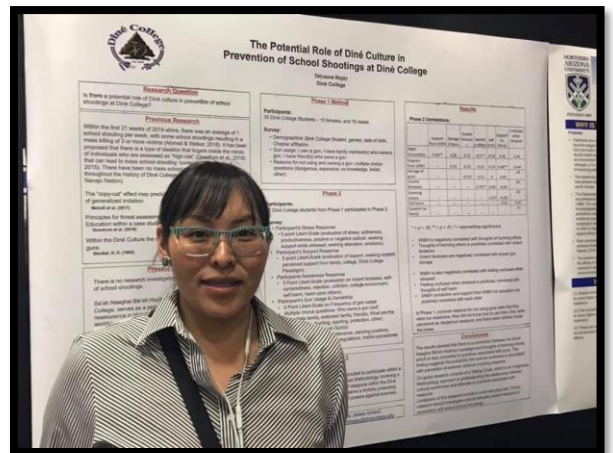
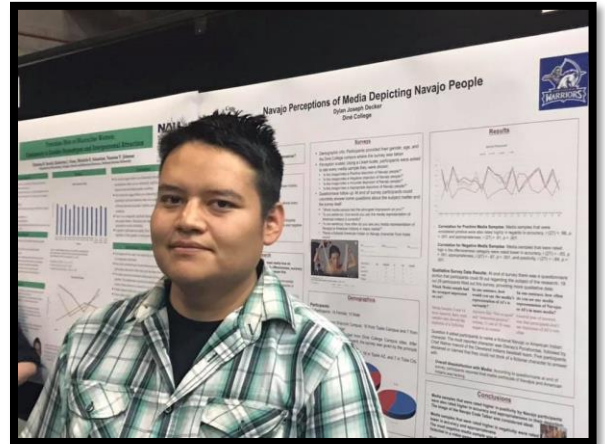
Dr. Sara Kien, Psychology Faculty

Special thanks to Dawayne Bahe for his support and to NAU faculty Ann Rumble and her research methods class for helping to coordinate and hosting a pizza lunch.



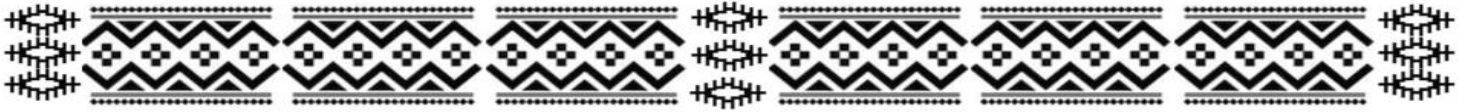
